My father-in-law tells a humorous story about a talent show he once attended. A young teenager, who was a member of her school marching band, approached the stage to display her skill with the trombone. She played three notes followed by a ten-beat foot tap. This continued. Three notes. Ten taps. Three notes. Ten taps. The problem was, she was playing her role in an ensemble—without an ensemble. As you can imagine, the performance fell short of the intended effect. Disconnected from the coordinated assemblage of performers, instruments and sheet music, the lone trombonist was just making noise.

Certain things in life can only be done well in a community. A prime example is a student's formation. Over a century ago, Asbury's founder, John Wesley Hughes, declared that Asbury existed to "develop the whole person." Much has changed since Hughes penned those words, but the vision of providing a holistic, formative educational experience remains constant in our present Asbury consciousness. Formation is not a solitary effort. The Asbury experience seeks to absorb students into a nexus of belonging, believing and becoming. 

Seizing every available opportunity

Senior Demarion Johnson '21, a native of Maysville, KY, has not let any opportunity along his Asbury journey slip away. As the first member of his family to attend college, he has embraced each opportunity, fully.

While he originally planned to attend a public university, Demarion's youth orchestra conductor, Charlie Hunter '11, suggested he take a college tour at Asbury.

Demarion says the second he stepped foot on campus, he knew Asbury was where he was being called.

“It felt like a confirmation that I was in the right place,” Demarion recalled. “During my tour, it happened to be the birthday of my tour guide. And everywhere we went, people were calling out ‘Happy Birthday!’ to him. Because I come from a small town, seeing that same sense of community here was important to me. It felt like a promise that this was a place where everyone knew everyone and looked out for one another. And that is a promise that Asbury has delivered on.”

Following his graduation this May, with a degree in communications with an emphasis in public relations, and a minor in political science. Demarion hopes to pursue a career in government or political communications in Washington, D.C.

“I hope to elevate the story of others by working in a Legislator’s office or even in the Executive Branch,” he said.

Already, Demarion has been in touch with Asbury alumni in Washington, D.C., who have offered their help getting him connected and settled as he launches the next phase of his journey.

That supportive outreach from members of the Asbury family didn't surprise him.

It's become something that he's grown to love — and expect about being an Asburian. Thanks to the support by faculty, Demarion felt empowered to grow his leadership skills and encouraged to succeed in the classroom.

As a freshman, he got involved in Asbury's Black Student Alliance, eventually going on to serve as the group's vice president. That experience led to a position on Student Congress. Demarion also served as his class president during his sophomore year and as the campus Vice President of Student Governance his junior year. And as a senior, Demarion is serving as Student Body President.

“Dr. Jim Shores, chair of the Department of Communication, was one of the professors who invested the most in my academics,” Demarion said. “He always encouraged me to elevate my work. And for that, I will be forever grateful.”

Now that Demarion is starting a new journey as a soon-to-be college graduate, his seven younger siblings are envisioning a similar journey for themselves.

“My family has been so grateful for the opportunities that I've had at Asbury,” he said. “And now, my little sister is dreaming of playing soccer here.”

Asbury Launches New Academic Programs

Honors Program, New Programs, Majors, and Minors Create Excitement

What gives people dignity? Exploring and identifying the answer to that question is the foundation of Asbury University's Honors Program.

Applications for this program are by invitation only for incoming freshmen, who upon acceptance receive various scholarships, a travel stipend for a Study Abroad Experience, course upgrades, special access to guest speakers, and more. Instead of adding more curricular requirements to the students' studies, the Honors Program aims to help pursue the spiritual, moral, social and ethical dimensions of the human experience.

Students will be accepted from any major and can still be involved in any extracurricular programs, meaning the program will represent the diversity of the entire campus. Together they will explore what it means to be made in the image of God and how His sacrificial love compels us to recognize our social interdependency and responsibility as they study and serve others together. Then, upon graduation, they will be able to relate these important concepts to their families, career, work and the local community.

Asbury's Honors Program is directed by Dr. Paul Nesselrode '89, a professor of Psychology, who has been published in numerous journals and has recently released a textbook on statistics. Nesselrode also sponsors the Human Dignity Tour of Central Europe, an educational trip to which Honors students can apply their travel stipend.

“The Honors Program is less interested in providing ready-made answers to current pop-culture questions as it is in helping students learn how to identify and appreciate the underlying issues at play,” said Nesselrode, “and then equipping them to draw deeply from the wellspring of historic Christian thought as they grapple with the challenging issues of the day — issues that concern identity, responsibility, justice, power and love.”

The Honors Program inaugural class will be 25 students. Through the application window earlier this year, 77 applications were received and 64 of those students were interviewed. As of the middle of March, 17 applications had been accepted with the decision deadline set for May 1, 2021. For more information on this new and exciting program, visit asbury.edu/honors.





One Alum's Journey:

A Lifelong Home

Jimmie Roper '16, a Detroit native, found a forever home at Asbury — one he wasn't expecting.

Jimmie had been a standout basketball player in high school, but he put college on hold for several years to find work to help support his mom.

“Basketball was my first love. That was my thing,” said Jimmie. “I wanted to go back to school to play basketball, but I didn't know where to start. All the scholarships that had been offered to me were gone. I felt like every opportunity was gone.” Then Jimmie's story shifted.

“It was definitely a God-thing for sure,” Jimmie said, noting that an email from Asbury men's basketball coach Will Shouse '02 felt like an answer to prayer. “I had been praying constantly, saying ‘God if you want me to go back to school, then show me the way.’”

Still, it took Jimmie a moment or two to adjust to the idea of moving from a large, culturally diverse urban center to a small Kentucky Christian school. That path wasn't necessarily on Jimmie's life journey plan, but sometimes life is about taking leaps of faith.

Once on campus, he knew he was right where he was meant to be.

“It was a huge culture shock, but as soon as I got to Wilmore, I just fell in love with this place,” said Jimmie, who played as a forward on the Asbury men's basketball team during the 2012-2013 season. “There was just something different about it. I didn't know what it was at the time. And of course, now I realize it was just where God was calling me to be.”

The Asbury men's basketball team became like a family to Jimmie, and he came to consider Coach Shouse and his wife, Whitney Smith '02, almost like adopted parents.

“They took me in and loved me as their own, still to this day,” he said.

Since graduating from Asbury in 2016 with a degree in recreation and ministry, Jimmie has made his home in Kentucky. He married Kayah, a teacher and photographer, one month after graduation. Together, they have welcomed a family: made up of a daughter and her three-year-old son, whom the couple officially adopted in March 2021 after several years of foster parenting. A year ago, they welcomed their biological daughter to the family.

“We just knew God was calling us to be with them for the rest of their lives,” Jimmie said.

As a student ministry pastor at Centenary United Methodist Church in Lexington, Jimmie is living the life of Christian ministry that he has always felt called to do.

It was at Asbury that Jimmie felt free to finally let his ministry calling shine. He organized Bible studies with teammates and for members of his residence hall. By his second semester, he'd been tapped as a spiritual leader on campus, and he often served as a keynote speaker to area middle and high schools' Fellowship of Christian Athletes programs.

At Centenary, Jimmie primarily works as a teaching pastor for middle and high school students — work he loves deeply since it allows him to pay forward the mentorship he received from his own youth pastors.

Since last September, Jimmie has also served as Asbury University's athletics chaplain, a role he cherishes. “I love staying involved on campus,” he said. “I go to the sporting events as much as I can. I love doing devotionals with the teams and praying with them. It's allowed me to remain an active part of the family that I found at Asbury.”

“Work as if you are in charge; pray as if God is in charge.” - E.Stanley Jones 1907





The dream of a Christian liberal arts education is becoming harder to attain for many young people due to the financial difficulties many students and their families are experiencing. Scholarships are especially critical right now.

Linda Shoults '68 Keller knows the verse, "The Lord loves a cheerful giver," said the apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 9:6-7. The Lord also loves faithful stewardship that comes not from a surplus or desire for acclaim but from the heart.

"God has blessed me way beyond what I've ever dreamed," Linda said.

The truth is Linda, a Christian Education major at Asbury, would have preferred to remain anonymous and would have if not for some arm twisting by fellow alumni who wanted her to share her story.

It is Linda's belief in Asbury's mission that inspired her to fund a variety of programs and initiatives at her alma mater, including the Visual Arts Scholars Fund, the Collaborative Learning Center, the Travis and Linda Shoults Keller Endowed Scholarship for School of Communication Arts and Asbury's journalism program.

"If I can help one or two kids a year, that's one or two who are getting a Christian education," Linda said. "I just feel for the younger generation. I hope these resources will encourage them that their faith and love for God is not being wasted because people out there are hungry for the truth."

By definition, journalism is a search for truth, which is why Linda decided recently to direct resources to Asbury's journalism program and specifically to the funding of a monthly speaker series called "Pressing Matters."

"We need to get Christian journalists out there because people aren't getting the truth," she said.

Linda said it was a conversation with her friend and former Asbury president, Dr. Sandra Gray, that sparked her interest in the journalism program.

"Journalism publishes words and God is the Word," she said. "Our students can hang onto that. If you have that talent for writing, don't be afraid. Words and the Word are powerful."

According to Linda, it was her late husband, Travis, who accompanied her to her 25th reunion at Asbury and saw an opportunity on campus.

"He really got me caught up in the mission of Asbury," she said.

"As we get older and mature, we treasure what we had at Asbury," she said. "There is a hunger and we're supposed to let our light shine. Asbury is really trying to do that. We need places like Asbury."

Travis died in 2013 but Linda carries on, providing opportunities for students, most of whom she will never meet.

And there will be scores of students, current and future, who will say places like Asbury need people like Linda Keller.

As a spiritual leader, King elevated the significance of the content of one's character as criteria for judgment, recognizing the brokenness of human nature. For King, who we are and what we are as people mattered. In his sermon, "What is Man?" King cautions us against an illusion born of superficiality: "It should be said that we err when we assume that because man is made in the image of God, man is basically good. Through his all too prevalent inclination for evil, man has terribly scarred God's image."

"At Asbury University it is our aim to cultivate the content of character, and it is our hope that in doing so we elevate the image of God in each one of us," said Rev. Jadhav.

NCAA Approves Division III Provisional Membership for Asbury University

The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) has approved Asbury University for Division III provisional membership, beginning September 1, 2021.

"This announcement is the culmination of a thorough review to determine the best missional fit for our intercollegiate athletics program," Asbury President Dr. Kevin J. Brown said. "The process involved the Presidential Cabinet, the Board of Trustees, the Athletics Department staff, the NCAA staff and several benchmark institutions.

"We are very grateful for the opportunity to provide an experience for our student-athletes, coaches and support staff that aligns with our academic and missional values."

"Asbury is committed to the unique student-athlete experience provided in the NCAA Division III structure. We look forward to this exciting opportunity and are most appreciative of the guidance and support from current NCAA Division III member institutions Transylvania University and Covenant College."

The NCAA Division III Membership Committee approved AU's exploratory application on February 24, 2021. Once accepted into the process, Asbury subsequently submitted the application for provisional membership along

with an application to waive the exploratory year. The 10-member committee determined that AU met the conditions and obligations for provisional membership. This decision made Asbury the first institution to apply for and be granted the waiver to accelerate the membership process from four years to three years.

"This is a very significant step for our University and the Athletics program," Mark Whitworth '84, vice president for Intercollegiate Athletics & University Strategic Communications said, "We are very grateful for the opportunity to provide an experience for our student-athletes, coaches and support staff that aligns with our academic and missional values. I am so thankful for the hard work of many in our campus community, particularly our Athletics leadership team."

Asbury becomes the fifth NCAA Division III institution in Kentucky, joining Centre College, Transylvania University, Berea College and Spalding University.

At the conclusion of the 2020-21 academic year, AU will transition from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA), the River States Conference (RSC) and the Appalachian Athletic Conference (AAC).

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One Team's Journey:

Plays a Game to Remember*

The basketball game ended. Then, something happened that I haven't seen.

Every member of the winning team stood and cheered the players they had just defeated; six members of the Asbury University women's basketball team. There were only six Asbury players in uniform to laud. The rest of the team was in COVID quarantine.

The standing ovation was an acknowledgment by the winners, from West Virginia Tech, that they had just witnessed something unusual, something heroic. This was more than a ceremonial handshake or fist bump. This was a tribute to the extraordinary.

Tech took the last shot in a 72-72 game, a desperate three-pointer as the buzzer blared. It was perfect. The Tech players mobbed the shooter at mid-court. But as the defeated Asbury players left the floor, most of them in tears, the winning team and the crowd stood as one, in appreciation for six young women who had given every bit of themselves for each other and for those who weren't here.

This is a good story and one that needs telling because you probably haven't heard about it. Nor will you. It isn't big enough. Small-college basketball. It wasn't on TV and no one will be discussing it on sports talk radio tomorrow. But it happened.



The sports-as-a-metaphor-for-life theme is overused. But if there's a better example of what a handful of young people are capable of when their greatest attributes are faith and commitment, I haven't seen it, at least not in person.

On a rainy Saturday afternoon in Wilmore, Kentucky, on Asbury's campus, the Lady Eagles basketball took the floor in a River States Conference semifinal against a powerful West Virginia Tech team. The Eagles consisted of one senior starter and five freshmen. The remaining starters and leading scorers weren't in the building. The purple and gray jerseys of those not here were draped over their seats on the bench.

With the same six players in uniform, the Eagles had already stunned a good Oakland City University (Indiana) team two days earlier, winning by 10 in the conference quarterfinal. It was the story of the year, at least so far. The conference had asked the Eagles if they even wanted to play the game.

“Not playing never entered our minds,” Eagles head coach Chad Mays said.

But Tech would be a much taller order. A better team with its full roster of players against an Eagles team which would, once again, start four true freshmen, two of whom saw very little playing time during the season. It seemed only a matter of time before the upstarts would run out of gas and hit a wall. Truth is, it would have surprised no one had the

Eagles lost by 25 — no one except the Eagles players themselves, who were unfazed by their circumstances.

Every time it looked as if Tech was ready to take control, the Eagles found a reserve, even taking an eight-point lead in the second half. This was Miracle, Hoosiers and Karate Kid in the making before our eyes.

Back and forth they went, as the lead changed hands multiple times in 40 minutes. With 53 seconds remaining, that game was tied at 72. The Eagles had a chance to take the lead but barely missed a driving layup attempt that rolled around the rim and out. Tech would hold for one last shot.

With time running out and nowhere to go, a Tech player launched a three-pointer that seemed to rest, temporarily, on a shelf in midair. And down it went.

As the Tech players piled on one another at midcourt, there stood Asbury's six — freshmen Kayla Harlow, Spencer Harvey, Trinity

Shearer, Paige Taylor, Emma Strunk and senior Kelsey Johnson — drained, staring in disbelief at the scoreboard.

No, this wasn't Hoosiers. Rocky, maybe, but not Hoosiers. And then it became something even better.

As the Tech players stood and applauded the six Eagles as they left the floor, I couldn't help but think of what those who weren't here, in this central Kentucky gym on Saturday, were missing.

It was perseverance in purple and gray. No excuses, no hesitation. It was mutual respect between rivals; a deep appreciation for one another, even those on the other side. It was selflessness embodied and a willingness to sacrifice, body and soul, for teammates.

A good story indeed. The heroes just happened to be basketball players.


