A Biblical Languages emphasis of the Ancient Languages Major involves the study of the primary languages of the Bible, Hebrew and Greek. The Scriptures are better understood in the original languages and with knowledge of the culture that produced its writings. In addition, students can acquire practical language tools and the linguistic distinctives of the major. A biblical language emphasis may also be chosen as a preparation for graduate studies at a seminary or institution of higher education.

Classical Languages is an emphasis in the Ancient Languages major that focuses on ancient Greek and Latin. Today, many of the languages in the western world are often related to these classical languages. Study of Greek and Latin is essential for biblical and early Christian studies, romance philosophy, or studies of ancient history and comparative literature. Many students contemplating graduate work in linguistics or the professional school of law, medicine, and dentistry find the classical languages advantageous undergraduate study. Teaching positions are available in both Greek (private schools) and Latin (public and private schools).

Latin is a classical language offered as a major at Asbury. Studies include vocabulary and grammar, as well as the culture, literature, history and geography in which Latin originated. In addition, a student may also attain a teaching certificate (P-12) in Latin. Many students contemplating graduate work in linguistics or the professional schools of law, medicine or dentistry find the study of a classical language to be an advantageous undergraduate major.

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To graduate must complete all major requirements, foundational requirements, and additional electives needed for 124 hour minimum degree requirement.
