President's Message



The Three Dimensions of Stewardship

I WANT TO SHARE THREE STORIES.

Years ago, I was made aware of a student who was working full-time to pay for his education at Asbury University. At one point, his financial situation became too precarious and something had to give, resulting in him deciding to drop classes. Upon hearing this, and in a radical act of generosity, his co-workers pooled their savings and covered his tuition so he could continue his education at Asbury and eventually graduate.

More recently, the 10-year-old daughter of one of our alums created, marketed, and sold beaded wristbands for a school project and decided to tithe the earnings of \$52.58 to Asbury for student scholarships.

And, I had lunch with a current student who had been accepted to a prestigious state school program that would assure him a job, cover his tuition, and even pay him a stipend. He chose Asbury instead. Why?

Because of the professors, community, and opportunities for spiritual formation.

These are but a few instances among seemingly infinite accounts of sacrifice, generosity, and commitment to the whole person education offered at Asbury University. The stories are heartwarming, but they also raise important questions of stewardship. What, for example, is our responsibility to the student and his generous co-workers whose financial sacrifice made his education possible? Or our responsibility to the selfless entrepreneurialism of adolescent Asburians? What about our responsibility to students who choose Asbury for academic and spiritual criteria unique to our school?

FOR ASBURY UNIVERSITY, I SEE THREE DOMINANT DIMENSIONS OF STEWARDSHIP.

First. we have fiduciary responsibility to faithfully and prudentially steward every dollar that is earned, gifted, and expensed as an institution. Fulfilling this responsibility

demands clearly articulated budget measurements, accountability to budget management, effective communication, prioritizing the budget items that best fulfill our mission, and operational efficiencies.

Second. in addition to our fiduciary responsibility, we have a relational obligation to our community, our students, our alumni, our donors, and our stakeholders to faithfully manage our resources, particularly as followers of Christ. I have often said that our identity not only speaks to "who" we are; it governs "how" we are. We are at our best when we fulfill our work through the currency of relationship, trust and goodwill.

Findly, stewardship means maintaining a missional fidelity to being a Christian university that takes both of those descriptors, Christian and university, seriously. Part of stewarding incoming tuition, auxiliary, and gift revenue to Asbury is recognizing that those dollars rely on an assumption of our institution maintaining a commitment to our mission of intellectually rigorous and spiritually formative education — academic excellence and spiritual vitality. Simply put, our students matriculate based upon our mission; donors give to Asbury to fulfill our mission.

Stewardship is not just management. It is more. It is our fiduciary, relational and missional responsibility to the students, staff, faculty, alumni and stakeholders — past, present and future — who have strengthened the Asbury architecture through sacrifice, generosity and commitment.

NEW OUTDOOR VENUE TO BE NAMED IN HONOR OF PRESIDENT EMERITUS DR. SANDRA GRAY

President Emeritus Dr. Sandra Gray has remained actively involved in support of Asbury since her leadership tenure from 2007 to 2019 during which Asbury experienced transformative growth still being realized today. The school went from a college to a university, launched a record-breaking fundraising campaign, made critical leadership hires, achieved enrollment records, opened the state-of-the-art Miller Center for Communication Arts, and so much more. And this spring, the Board of Trustees announced by unanimous vote that the new Outdoor Venue will be named in honor of Dr. Sandra Gray. The venue's mission is to open Asbury to the community in a larger way.

"It is fitting that a president who had such a sense of hospitality and love for our students and the Asbury family is honored in this way," said Vice President for Institutional Advancement and Strategic Partnerships Dr. Mark Troyer. "Her desire to expand Asbury's reach and impact makes this an easy decision to connect her tenure with a venue that will welcome more students, families and friends to Asbury University for decades to come."

Construction on Phase I of the project is complete and includes a collegiate competition track, field events area, turf soccer field, lights, fencing, storage building, and the beginning of stadium seating. The second and final phase of the project begins this spring and will be complete by summer 2025. It will include two buildings, landscaping, expanded parking and access areas, and additional media and technology including a video scoreboard. The buildings will provide meeting space, public restrooms, locker rooms, a training room, and referee and coach spaces.

The Advancement team is working on raising the final \$3 million to complete the project, which will total more than \$12 million and Troyer invites alumni and friends to honor the former president by joining in the final phase of fundraising for the important project.

We are all the recipients of Dr. Gray's legacy of effective leadership and service. I feel as though we are harvesting seeds she faithfully planted years ago. Dr. Gray has been an effective, influential, and transformative leader without compromising character. I do not know of a higher compliment.

"Asbury is not simply a non-profit educational entity or a degree-granting institution," said President Dr. Kevin Brown. "Asbury is a broad community of women and men who, though diverse in background, share in a lifealtering, transformative experience of intellectual growth, character formation, and being tightly woven into the communal fabric of brothers and sisters in Christ. Asbury is characterized by its people, and its people are characterized by a thick sense of Christian community."

With this mission at the forefront, Asbury's leadership has thoughtfully stewarded its funds in a way that honors Christ, helping lead to the University endowment almost doubling in the last decade, reaching approximately \$74 million. More than two-thirds of the funds are directed to student scholarships, continuing the efforts to make Asbury as affordable as possible.

Stewardship (expense controls and operational efficiencies) is part of Brown's three-year Strategic Focus, announced at the end of 2023. The plan's other facets are Sustainable Growth (revenue generation) and Cultural Climate (trust, communication, and missional buy-in). The vision requires clearly articulated budget measurements, accountability, effective communication, budgeting priorities that best fulfill Asbury's mission, and operational efficiencies that release staff and faculty to focus on activities core to the mission. The stewardship of time is as important as the stewardship of funds.

KEEPING COSTS LOW FOR STUDENTS

The ongoing work of stewardship also translates to Asbury maintaining one of the state's lowest room and board rates, helping make an excellent academic experience. In fall of 2023, Asbury welcomed its second largest incoming class in history and 100 percent of those students received financial aid, as well as added scholarships and grants.

"I think it is important to talk about our definition of being 'student centric'," noted Brown. "Specifically, being student centric means 'organizing strategies, resources, and decisions in a manner that prioritizes the student's intellectual, communal, moral, and spiritual good — their preparation, maturation, opportunities, and well-being."

Senior **Charlie Cox** explains how financial donations funded the continuation of his business administration degree.

"In between my sophomore and junior year, my parents died in a car accident," he explained. "It was solely through the help of financial donors that has allowed me to continue to come to Asbury. I think of Paul when he has a thorn in his flesh and cries out to the Lord to heal it. God says, 'my grace is sufficient for you, for my strength is made perfect in weakness.' When I look at my


time at Asbury, I see individuals strengthening me in my weakness, and that's a gift from God."



As Brown said, with each project, program, initiative, or donation, the faithful drivers behind formation and stewardship are the people. Engaging a mindset of service and humility, we thank the Lord for a generous community of those involved with the stewardship focus of Asbury thus far.

"Giving to Asbury and funding our scholarships is a 'living vote' for the next generation of Asburians who are going to serve the professions, institutions, and the Church in faithful neighbor-serving, God-honoring ways," Brown said. "I am more confident in the coming generation than ever."





Asbury gathered in Hughes one year later to celebrate and worship the God-led spiritual awakening that began on Feb. 8, 2023.

It's hard to imagine one year has passed since God poured out overwhelming love on Asbury's campus during the Outpouring in Feb. 2023. The Asbury community gathered during multiple events in the week of Feb. 5, 2024, to remember and celebrate the work He did then and continues to do now.

Hughes Auditorium rang with worship during a special Chapel on Wednesday, Feb. 7, and a community service on Thursday night to honor those who have supported Asbury through prayer, volunteering, and discipling students during and since the Outpouring. The following evening, Worship Him at Midnight (WHAM)/Gen Z worship facilitated a space where students shared their personal testimonies and gathered in prayer for the next generation's spiritual climate, while reminiscing on how the event influenced the faith journey of Asburians.


In the last year, I have remarked many times that I don't know if there is a particular formula for what creates what we saw and experienced last February, but I have some sense of what sustains it. What fosters it. What gives it structure. And what gives space to unfold. The people; and people of a certain character. Selfless and radically humble. With a high spiritual temperature, a holy imagination.

In the year since the miraculous 16-day move of God, Asbury has watched in awe how God has made himself known to the campus community and many others around the world. Many witnesses traveled to testify on the University's spiritual transformation.

"A year ago, God generously poured out His power, presence, kindness, and gentleness, which captivated a generation and a lot of Christian leaders who needed hope," said Asbury Pastor in Residence Zach Meerkreebs. "In Galatians 6:9, it says 'Don't grow weary for doing good, for in due time you will reap what you sow.' I think the Outpouring was an encouragement for those who were weary, getting to experience the reaping for those 16 days and even now."

In January, Meerkreebs spoke to 55,000 college students at Passion Conference in Atlanta, Ga., an annual conference with a purpose to unite college students from around the nation for a spiritual awakening. It was one of many trips made around the nation and the world by members of Asbury's community in the last year.

"We were so humbled to be a part of Passion, and both share about the Outpouring and plead for these students to contend for more!" said Meerkreebs. "The team there was humble, hungry, and so moved by what they saw and learned from Asbury."



Tens of thousands of people in audiences have heard the Gospel and stories of the Outpouring from Asbury witness teams. A recent group shared at Mission Connexion in Portland, Ore., addressing intercessory prayer and revival, while other students congregated at nationwide churches, conferences, and universities to tell their stories.

Elena Overman '25, pictured on page 8, second from right, served on church witness teams and discussed how the opportunity to testify a year later impacts her faith journey.

"Having the opportunity to speak about the impact of the Outpouring a year later was honestly extremely cathartic," she said. "A lot can happen in a year, and I am endlessly grateful for the work that God has done in my life. Getting to share about His mercy and grace has been one of the greatest honors of my life."

"Jesus met me and so many other people in Hughes last February. On the second day of the Outpouring, I had a vision of multitudes gathering on the steps of

Hughes with the 'fire' spreading out onto the sidewalks and around the globe," said Simmons. "My mind was blown as I witnessed thousands coming here to experience God in a deeper way. I tried to capture what the Holy Spirit burned on my heart through painting."

Throughout the remembrance week in February, Office of Spiritual Life also hosted a workshop "How to Share your Story," which gave students pointers on how to break down the life-changing events of the Outpouring and communicate it with utmost care and authenticity, giving more Asburians confidence to go out and share the Good News.

Asbury's Intercultural Life Honors Students and Their Unique Cultural Backgrounds

Enrollment of international, U.S. ethnic minority and third culture students has grown by more than 11 percent over the past 20 years at Asbury. Thanks to the Office of Intercultural Life's new location on the third floor of the Rader Student Center, there is space for these students to gather and be supported, complete with a lounge and a conference room for student leaders to plan events and programs. Through the generosity of a donor, the lounge is consistently stocked with teas, snacks, and sweets from local markets that represent the students' home countries.

The new community space is an extension of the many resources the Office of Intercultural Life provides for the students it serves, from the Intercultural New Student Asbury's Intercultural Life Honors Students and Their Unique Cultural Backgrounds Orientation (INSO) at the beginning of the school year to monthly student alliance gatherings and cultural heritage festivals. Students experience numerous opportunities to adjust to campus life while still celebrating their cultural backgrounds and can also share their home cultures with their peers.

Dr. Dawn Kilian is in her third year as director of Intercultural Life.
Throughout her tenure, she has focused on building a campus-wide intercultural community through a balance of events for the entire campus to celebrate different cultural traditions represented in Asbury's student body, as well as events on and off campus for members of these intercultural groups.





In September, students received transportation support and money to purchase authentic cuisine at Lexington's Latino Festival. Intercultural Life's immersive trip to the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center in Cincinnati supplied lunch and transportation to and from the museum. Recently, students enjoyed KPOT Korean BBQ and Hot Pot's authentic Asian food to celebrate the Lunar New Year.

Another feature of Intercultural Life is the opportunity for student leadership and growth which Kilian names as another priority of her work with the student leaders of each alliance group. The Black, Latino, Asian, and International Student Alliances and MuKappa (missionary students and third-culture students) each have two student leaders who plan events and provide support to the students in their group. JOB EXPERIENCE IN A GLOBAL SETTING

A Cross Cultural Experience (CCE) is a requirement amongst undergrad students in order to strengthen their abilities in interacting with the world community, to expand their worldview, and to increase their cultural sensitivity. Asbury's Deese Initiative Program (formerly the Asbury Initiative Program) gives Asbury students the opportunity to explore vocational, global service opportunities prior to graduation, with the intent of potentially empowering a new generation of long-term international service.

Founded in 2003, the former Asbury Initiative Program was established with a pledge of \$1 million from **Phyllis McRoberts '53 West** and her husband, Stephen R. West, in honor of the life and ministry of **Ernest M. Steury, M.D. '53** and **Mrs. Jennie Sue Groce '54 Steury** who served as missionaries in Kenya with World Gospel Mission.

The program received permanent funds and rebranding from **Wynelle Scott '61 Deese** in 2020 allowing it to continue as one of the most incredible opportunities on campus for students.

The Judge and Mrs. J.W. Deese Initiative Program continues to further the purpose of volunteer work in the areas of international community, social and economic development, public wellness and treatment, literacy and education, and other public services in developing countries.

The Deese grant awards students funds to fully cover a five-to-eight-week service experience in a developing country, plus a \$300/week stipend to cover lost wages in the summer.

Six recipients have traveled across the globe in the past two years thanks to the Deese Initiative Program. Some of the vocational focuses for mission services include history, global health communications, social work, and equine-assisted services.

"The collaborative nature of storytelling has been fun with this series," said Boss, a former Media Communication and Spanish student. "I get to use what I learned about writing good stories from professors Sean Gaffney, **Andrea Gyertson '95 Nasfell**, and Rich Manieri."

Boss collaborated with Asbury's Associate Professor of Screenwriting Sean Gaffney to produce this series. Gaffney brings significant industry experience to the table, previously working as story administrator for Warner Bros. Features.

Halfway through college, Boss found his passion for animation and storyboarding and later began taking Project City TV classes guided by DreamWorks story artist, Radford Sechrist, guiding him through writing, storyboarding, and editing a pilot for his original series, "Blue Mountain Mysteries."

After graduating, through his class connections, Boss received an email to freelance for a feature film for Nickelodeon.

"I was very afraid of not finding work and jumped into the first part-time job I could find. I was working at Starbucks the same time I was working with Nickelodeon."

After freelancing with the network, Boss took a risk and quit part time work to pursue more creative endeavors.

"I was taking jumps in which God met me, but I was still having trouble trusting," said Boss, explaining his switching between part-time jobs and creative work. "A week later, I get an email from Sean Gaffney to work on 'Gabriel and the Guardians.""

As of now, "Gabriel and the Guardians" has locked several scripts in its early production process and given the coproduction efforts between the U.S. and Japan on this series, the episodes also will be translated into Japanese. Boss's storyboarding feature film work will be seen on Nickelodeon once it wraps production.

"Asbury taught me that the trick isn't how good you are at your craft, the trick is to be someone who is kind," said Boss. "I haven't received a single job in media from portfolios, but from people who I showed kindness to."

"This book is important for practitioners, parents, and church workers to help ensure that students learn the content we're trying to teach them, whether it's from the state standards or biblical principles, in a public school, a private school, Sunday School, or youth group," said Owiny, who serves as Assistant Professor of Special Education at Minnesota State University, Mankato.

ASBURIANS CROSS THE 100-MILE FINISH LINE

Asbury graduate, **Jonathan Miller '19** ran the Tunnel Hill race, an incredible and challenging 100-mile, 24-hour trek, with Asbury friends to help him cross the finish line.

In college, Miller played soccer for TeamAU and made the all-state team but sought out challenges to test his athleticism.

"I did a 50-mile race my junior year with no training," said Miller. "After, I planned to do the 100-miler and asked my friends to run it with me one day."

Five years later, Miller's Asbury friends, **Joel Wafford '21** and **Hayden Dwyer '20**, would help him run the last 50 miles of Tunnel Hill in the freezing November nighttime temperatures. Running the wooded terrain with only a headlamp and a vest holding water, clothes, and caffeinated sports gels, Miller raced with Wafford or Dwyer waiting to reach the next aid station, a checkpoint signaling his closeness to the finish line.

After eating more than 15 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches and 15 cheeseburgers while burning more than 10,000 calories and suffering from bleeding foot blisters and severe pain, Miller neared the end where his wife, **Cathryn Lien'18 Miller**, and mother, **Danielle Boisvert '93 Miller**, waited for him.

"By the end, I really started complaining a lot and asked both Joel and Hayden to finish with me. I had been wanting to do the 100-miler since being at Asbury with them in 2018," said Miller. "At one point I couldn't run in a straight line, and I just had to overcome it. I told my friends, 'You can't let me quit."

The three Asburians crossed the finish line of the Illinois Tunnel Hill race with Miller running 100 miles for 27 sleepless hours. Wafford and Dwyer ran more than 26 miles — a full marathon in and of itself.

"Finishing the Tunnel Hill 100 is the hardest thing I have ever done. It wouldn't have been possible without having Hayden and Joel run with me" said Miller. "Achieving my dream alongside two of my best friends was an unforgettable experience."

Stewardship of funds that help create scholarships is critical to the continued momentum in enrollment along with the mentorship and intentional community building by Asbury faculty and staff.


"We are praising God for his abundance and faithfulness," McChord continued. "Please continue praying for our current students and our future student body."

Katherine Sheets '21 and communication professor Dr. Elizabeth Jones co-authored a paper entitled, "Identifying Loss and Grief in Children's Animated Films," which won a Top Paper Award from the Mass Communication Division of the National Communication Association. Sheets presented the paper in November at the National Communication Association conference in National Harbor, Md.

"In the study, we examined death and non-death related loss and grief expressions in children's animated films," Jones and Sheets said. "This mixed-methods content analysis of the 18 top-grossing films investigated two research questions:

1) How is loss portrayed in children's animated films across the U.S. animation industry? and 2) How are the five stages of grief depicted in children's animated films across the U.S. animation industry?"



MAYES EARNS 100TH CAREER WIN

Asbury women's basketball Head Coach Chad Mayes collected his 100th career win at AU on Jan. 31, 2024, with a 71-54 victory over Alice Lloyd College. The Eagles, led by senior Trinity Shearer's 12.9 points per game, finished the season with a 19-10 record and the program's third-consecutive appearance in the National Christian College Athletics Association (NCCAA) championship tournament. Coach Mayes is now 104-64 (.619) since being named head coach in 2018, going 58-28 (.674) in the last three seasons.

TRACK AND FIELD OFFICIALLY RETURNS TO ASBURY



Asbury's men's and women's track and field teams broke multiple school records at the NCCAA Indoor National Championships.

Asbury University men's and women's track and field officially returned to competition in January, led by head coach O'Brian Bridges. The special opening day featured three Asbury first place finishes against Capital University, Mount Vernon Nazarene. and Ohio Dominican. JoJo Ernst '27 won the 1,000-meter run and Bailey Gassmann '27 finished first in the mile and 1.000-meter events.

Asbury also competed in the NCCAA Indoor National Championships Feb. 9-10. The Eagles broke multiple school records in the meet, including senior **Wes Preston's** 3,000-meter record time (9:14.59) that was previously held by the late **Justin Spoon '21**.

"It has been a blessing and honor to be a part of bringing track and field back to Asbury," said Bridges. "A lot of preparation has gone into where we are today, I am so grateful to be a part of history here at AU!"

TEAMAU EARNS 3.36 OVERALL SEMESTER GPA

Asbury Athletics celebrated an overall department fall 2023 semester GPA of 3.36, with 167 TeamAU student-athletes earning scholar-athlete honors with a 3.5 or above GPA. An impressive 190 student-athletes earned TeamAU Honor Roll status with a GPA of 3.25 or above.

ASBURY SWIMMING NAMED SCHOLAR-AMERICA TEAMS

Asbury's men's and women's swimming teams were both named Scholar-American Teams for the 2023 fall semester by the College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA). The women's team earned an impressive 3.57 team GPA while the men's team posted a 3.06.

Greg came from a long lineage of Asburians and lived around the Louisville area, which meant familiarity. "My earliest

memories were of family coming to our house from Asbury on the weekends," said Greg. "I've always had this tie to the University."

Whereas Trisha had never heard of Asbury until her senior year when a pastor took her to visit campus and encouraged her to apply.

"I wasn't planning on going to college, but I loved it," said Trisha. "My home life was very chaotic, so I saw Asbury as a sweet, sanctuary place to grow up for another four years."

A powerfully decisive moment for Trisha was an awards night of her senior year of high school. Simply showing up to support her friends, she was surprised by Asbury's Dean of Students and was personally gifted the Presidential Scholarship of \$1,000 to come to Asbury, which she says sealed the deal for her.

Greg and Trisha met at a freshmen orientation service and started dating two months later. While studying education at Asbury, Trisha served as a resident assistant (RA) of Glide-Crawford. At the same time, Greg double majored in accounting and business management, played tennis and class ball (the Asbury version of intercollegiate basketball), and was a Johnson West (1st floor) RA. They became engaged before their senior year and graduated with the Commanders, Asbury's 100th graduating class.

"It's our little bragging right to be a part of the 100th class," beamed Trisha.

The Hintz couple stayed connected with Asbury in many ways — attending Reunions, visiting campus to see their son, **Wade Hintz '20**, spending time with friends in Wilmore — but the most significant connection point is through the professional sphere.

Working for a big four accounting firm and then transitioning to a top 10 accounting firm, Crowe LLP, Greg loves to keep contact with Asbury professors and hire students into his firm.

"I'm so proud of the Asbury accounting students," said Greg. "They have a willingness to work and are above everybody else in maturity, capability, and value systems. Asbury is one of the places we want to hire from because we've had such success."

The couple started their giving journey with Greg's leadership on the 2016-2019 subcommittee for naming the Walt and Rowena Shaw Collaborative Learning Center (Shaw CLC) atrium in honor of former Asbury professor **Don Winslow '65**, a founding faculty member in Asbury's Business Department.

"I can't even begin to describe how influential Don was in every facet of our lives," Greg said, discussing his work in the subcommittee to honor Winslow. "To me, that's one of the beautiful things about Asbury, how professors pour into students unlike anywhere else. Don would have all of us accounting kids over at his house and prep us for interviews."

They continued their generous giving toward the atrium over a five-year pledge. The couple recently pledged a generous donation for the Outdoor Venue, a multifunctional, first-rate facility that will serve to help athletes train and compete at a high level, and also as a venue for sponsoring concerts, worship nights, and facilitating a range of events through which Asbury shares Christ's love with students, alumni, faculty and staff, friends and families, and the wider community.

Today, Greg still works as a CPA and is looking forward to retirement. The Hintzes are enjoying a new phase of life with their three adult children, Wade, Evan, and Bethany. 
